We have acquired two new prairie king snakes from a critter-snatcher friend and neighbor of mine. The larger one on display is okay to handle but BE WARNED - IT IS FAST! The other smaller king is in the tank higher on the shelf against the wall. All tanks now have snakes in them, so please be careful and cautious with the animals and enclosures. These two new snakes have not been handled very often so please proceed with caution.

We have another tarantula. Its display area is in the touch table room next to the copperhead tank. Please keep it here. It is too much of a traffic jam and distraction at the front desk. For those who like to handle the animal, please do so sparingly. Constant in-and-out of the tank is stressful for the animal. If you choose to handle it, do so in the touch table room. Make SURE that those entering the touch table room are aware that it is out of the tank.



Also, if you enjoy it that much, consider using her and the black widow in a

spider program. Rick Dashnau has provided us with those laminated photos behind the front desk, and we have a large plastic spider to help with anatomy. Summer is spider season and it would make a wonderful addition to our weekend programming.

BBEEC PLANNING MEETING

Notes by David Heinicke

On June 25, 2014, BBSP staff Chris Bishop, David Heinicke and Sharon Hanzik and volunteers Offie Walker and Barbara Willy met with Justin Rhodes, Regional Director, TPWD, to discuss the next step we can take in the development of a new Brazos Bend Environmental Education Center.

After a brief history of the project by David Heinicke, Park Superintendent Chris Bishop confirmed management support of the project and restated the need for a new larger education center. Offie Walker reported on conversations with Brent Leisure, Parks Division Director and Scott Buroff, Deputy Director of TPWD. Barbara Willy presented an overview of the building drawings and discussed the fundraising plans and marketing approach.

Following the presentations, there was discussion on the roles of TPWD and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Foundations on the BBEEC project. This will be further clarified by communication among the parties involved. Several action items will be reported on at the next meeting of the BBEEC.

Update: Brent Leisure met with Carter Smith, TPWD Executive Director, who is supportive of the project. There will be a meeting with the Parks and Wildlife Foundation of Texas to gauge their interest in either leading or supporting the project.

ARTS IN THE PARKS

BBSP has a new Summer Youth Program this summer held on Thursdays, 9:30 AM to 11;30 AM, June 19 through July 31 for children ages 8 and up. BLOOD DRIVE

We had a VERY successful July 12th Blood Drive. Our goal, set by the Blood Center, was 21 units of blood. We ended the drive with 33 units of blood. Out of 32 potential donors, 24 were able to donate. Nine donors of red blood cells/plasma (counts as 2 units) and fifteen donors of whole blood gave us the 33 units. Eighteen Visitors and fourteen Staff /Volunteers/Hosts made up the 32 donors. Thanks to everyone who helped or donated. You made it a great success.

HEAT PROBLEMS

Summer is here, and with it, heat-related dangers. Remember to keep an eye on the public and fellow volunteers during these hot summer months. Carry extra water in case you come across a visitor with heat problems. Here are some facts about heat and some steps to protect yourself from heat-related illness and harmful ultraviolet radiation.

On the average, 384 people die each year from heat stroke.

Heat related injuries seem to occur often with the elderly or with people who are not in good physical condition or acclimatized to the heat.

There are 4 major heat-related health problems:

Heat Rash (Prickly Heat) - a painful rash, treated by resting in cool places.

Heat Cramps - painful muscle spasms that result from the loss of salt and electrolytes due to excessive sweating, treated by drinking fluids containing electrolytes.

- **Heat Exhaustion** weakness, nausea and headache brought on by the loss of fluids during excessive sweating. Skin is clammy and moist, complexion pale and body temperature normal or slightly higher. Treat by cooling off with cool compresses, elevating the feet and giving the victim plenty of fluids.
- **Heat Stroke** a severe medical emergency where the body's core temperature gets too high. The victim will have hot, dry skin, high pulse, and low blood pressure. Treat immediately by cooling the victim with water or wrapping him in cool wet sheets. Seek immediate medical attention.

Ways to prevent heat-related health problems:

- **Drink Up:** Thirsty or not, drink plenty of water a cup every 15 to 20 minutes. Avoid caffeine or alcohol.
- Acclimatize: It takes time to adjust to working in heat. Gradually increase your work load and heat exposure.

Diet: Eat light and stay away from heavy foods.

- **Cover Up and Protect:** Wear lightweight, light-colored, loose-fitting clothing, UV rated sunglasses and a wide-brim hat. Apply sunscreen with a Sun-Protection Factor of at least 30. Re-apply every 2 hours and after sweating.
- Shield from Sun: Set up shade or use umbrellas, buildings or trees to shield you from the rays of the sun.
- **Time it Right:** Avoid the sun and strenuous tasks between 11:00 AM and 4:00 PM.

Cool Off: Pace your work activities at a slower rate and take breaks to rest and cool off in the shade or in air-conditioned buildings or vehicles. Don't over-exert yourself.

- Significantly higher than usual levels of nitrates and phosphates in Pilant Lake, confirmed via retesting. Possibly due to die-off of the algae noted last month

Notes/Comments:

- Water temperatures significantly higher this month, despite our unusually cool spring. The previous few days, however, saw air temperatures into the mid-80s. Since we are measuring from the shore in relatively shallow water, we expect to see a close mirroring of air temperature.
- There was some duckweed and algae present, though less than in February.
- Pilant retained the high phosphate levels seen last month. Phosphates can enter waterways from both natural and manmade sources. Since Pilant's water source (runoff) is contained entirely in BBSP, the higher levels are probably natural in origin, possibly from plant die off (sulfurous smell from Pilant noted in February indicated high levels of decomposition).

TPWD NEWS

TPWD PUBLIC HUNT DRAWING SYSTEM GOING PAPERLESS

TPWD has changed its procedures for the public hunts held in state parks. No more hunt booklets will be delivered to the parks. Everything is online now. BBSP usually hosts two public deer/hog hunts in November and December and a youth specific hunt in February. Effective with this summer's applications, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's popular Public Hunt Drawing System will be online-only. The Public Hunt Drawing System offers affordable hunting experiences in more than two dozen different hunt categories, including eight specifically for youth only. Applications will only be accepted online — no "Applications for Drawings on Public Hunting Lands" booklets or application forms will be printed and mailed out.

With the new paperless system, hunters will be able to browse the drawn hunt catalog by hunt category and location using interactive maps, as well as complete the application and pay online. Selected applicants will be notified by email and can accept permits and pay any fees online. Permits will be issued by email and can be printed at home or stored on a mobile device. Those applicants who are not selected may still be eligible through a secondary drawing if any permits are unclaimed by the payment deadline. There may still be opportunities for traditional standby hunts at some locations.

In addition to now being able to apply for multiple hunt areas within the same hunt category (i.e. apply for a Gun Deer — Either Sex hunt on more than one hunt area), the online system will give hunters more time to apply. Application deadlines start in August and wrap up in January. Applicants will have until midnight on the day of the deadline to apply. The new online-only system will begin accepting electronic applications in July for 2014-15 Drawn Hunts, including Special Permit hunts, E-Postcard hunts, and US Forest Service Antlerless Deer Permits. ZEBRA MUSSELS – DON'T TAKE THEM WITH YOU

A Video News Report is now available on the TPWD site called "Zebra Mussels." A new Texas rule, just passed by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission, expands boat draining rules from 47 counties to statewide. The rule will go into effect July 1 and requires boats and other vessels operating on all public lakes, rivers and creeks to be completely drained to help combat the further spread of zebra mussels. Zebra mussels are a destructive invasive species that can damage motor boats, hurt aquatic life, hinder water recreation and even affect our water supply by clogging water intake systems.
